Newly constructed in 1999, and with a state-of-the-art technology infrastructure, Sargent Hall is a majestic addition to the heart of downtown Boston. Sara Rosenbaum, JD, holds the Harold & Jane Hirsh Professorship of Health Law and Policy at the George Washington University Medical Center, School of Public Health and Health Services, where she also serves as the Director of the Center for Health Services Research and Policy, and the Interim Chair of the Department of Health Policy. For nearly 30 years, Professor Rosenbaum has played a major role in the design of U.S. health law and policy, particularly in the areas of managed care, health insurance, civil rights and health care for the poor and medically underserved. In 1993 and 1994 Professor Rosenbaum worked for the White House, where she directed the legislative drafting of the Health Security Act for President Clinton.

Professor Rosenbaum has been named one of America's 500 most influential health policy makers and is the co-author of *Law and the American Health Care System* (Foundation Press, New York, NY), a leading health law textbook.

Barry R. Furrow is a Professor of Law and Director of the Health Law Institute at Widener University School of Law in Wilmington, Delaware. Before taking up teaching, he clerked with the Superior Court of Massachusetts and then practiced law with Palmer & Dodge in Boston. While in practice at Palmer & Dodge, Professor Furrow developed an early interest in the growing field of health law, representing such clients as Massachusetts General Hospital, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Massachusetts, and other insurance companies.

Professor Furrow has taught as a regular or visiting faculty member at the law schools of the University of Michigan, the University of Detroit, American University, the University of North Carolina, George Mason University and Seton Hall, where he was the Merck Visiting Scholar in the spring of 1998. His teaching has included courses in Health Care Liability and Quality, Managed Care, Health Care Regulation, and Comparative Health Law. In 1995, the Health Law Section of the American Society of Law, Medicine and Ethics awarded Professor Furrow the Jay Healey Distinguished Health Law Teacher Award.


Professor Furrow is a member of the editorial board of the *Journal of Law, Medicine & Ethics* and the Advisory Board of the Social Science Research Network's *Health Law and Policy Abstracts, Accepted Paper Series*. He is also a regular peer reviewer for the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, *Health Affairs*, and the *Journal of Health Policy, Politics and Law*.

Professor Furrow received his JD in 1971 from Harvard Law School and his undergraduate degree in 1967 from Harvard College. His publications include: *Health Law: Cases, Materials and Problems* (4th Edition 2001, West Publishing Company, with Johnson, Jost and Schwartz); *Health Law* (Practitioners' Series, West, 2nd Edition, 2000, with Greaney, Johnson, Jost, and Schwartz); *Health Law* (Student Hornbook Series, West, 2nd Edition, 2000, with Greaney, Johnson, Jost and Schwartz); *Malpractice in Psychotherapy* (Lexington Books, 1980); and more than four dozen articles in such journals as the *University of Pennsylvania Law Review*, the *Harvard Civil Rights-Civil Liberties Law Review*, the *St. Louis University Law Journal*, *Boston University Law Review*, the *American Journal of Law & Medicine* and *Health Matrix*.

Hellfire Nation Sinners, Morals and Health Care Policy

James Morone is a Professor of Political Science at Brown University in Providence, RI. His book *The Democratic Wish: Popular Participation and the Limits of American Government* won the American Political Science Association's 1991 Gladys M. Kammerer Award for the best book in the United States and was named a "notable book of 1991" by The New York Times. A revised edition was published in 1998. Professor Morone's latest book, scheduled for publication in the spring of 2003, is *Hellfire Nation: The Politics of Sin in American History*, published by the Yale University Press.

Professor Morone has testified before Congress numerous times. He was the secretary of Governor Cuomo's task force on Universal Health Care for all New Yorkers, (UNY*CARE), and was a member of the National Academy of Science Committee on the Social and Ethical Impacts of Developments in Biomedicine. He is on the editorial board of seven scholarly journals and chairman of the editorial board of three; he is a past editor of *The Journal of Health Politics, Policy and Law*. Professor Morone is a founding member of the National Academy of Social Insurance, an honorary organization of scholars and practitioners who have made significant contributions to American social welfare policy. He is the immediate past President of the Politics and History section of the American Political Science Association and the current President of the New England Political Science Association.

Professor Morone received his BA at Middlebury College and his PhD at The University of Chicago. He has been on the faculty of The University of Chicago, Yale University, and the University of Bremen (Germany). The Brown University classes of 1993, 1999 and 2001 awarded Professor Morone the Barret Hazeltine Citation for outstanding teaching.
